

Being destitute is a problem faced by the modern man. Even amid plenty this feeling disturbs many. Many are getting orphaned in this world. It does not necessarily mean someone who lacks parental care. The state in which there is no one to give advice, assistance, help, discipline, and love is also destitution. If we don't have anyone to love or to be loved or to talk to, we can be considered orphans.

Jesus Christ's death orphaned his disciples. He seems to have considered this issue very seriously. He was a comrade to the destitute. He had no problem being the friend of the sinners and the tax collectors. He visited the house of Zacchaeus, whom everyone discarded. ARISE - 2024

Throughout the month of April, the youth have continued their fortnightly Midweek Meditations. The session begins with vespers and compline in English, following with a mediation session led by a fellow youth member on a theme or portion from the bible.

On 3 April 2024 the youth participated in a debate on the topic 'is it necessary to have a community to grow in your faith?', facilitated by Sam Jacob. On 17 April 2024, guest speaker Rev. Fr. Ferdinand Pathrose spoke about Isaiah 60:1 'Arise, shine', reflecting on lessons learnt from the recent MGOCSM & OCYM East Asia Region camp.

The MGOCSM & OCYM East Asia Region camp was held from 4th to 6th April at Weekaway Camp in Benloch. Approximately 50 youth from SMIOC attended the camp, joining over 200 youth and clergy from New Zealand, Malaysia, Singapore and interstate within Australia. The theme was 'Arise' based on Isiah 60:1, "Arise, shine for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord rises upon you". The camp involved spiritual session led by resource persons, activities including laughing yoga, flying fox, giant maze, laser tag and canoeing, and a forum led by the resource persons.

Here are some reflections from our youth members:

This year's youth camp proved to be an enriching experience for all of us. The speeches provided by Father Abey George and His Grace. Dr. Yuhanon Mar Demetrios were particularly insightful.

We delved into the analogy of the church as a hospital, exploring how God's transformative power heals us. This journey was illuminated through the inspiring stories of Saint Mary of Egypt and Saint Moses the Ethiopian. Additionally, we explored our purpose and responsibilities as members of our church.

JOURNEY THROUGH ST.PAUL'S FOOTSTEPS (A SERIES)

Part 5

After the cruise our group had a dinner together on a roof top restaraunt which had another amazing view of the Bosphorus and the shimmering lights of the city and its monuments. We returned to our hotel and was instructed to be ready by 7:30a.m for the drive around Tukey, 27000kms! Breakfast was open from 6:30a.m but our bags had to be ready and placed outside our rooms to be picked up by the hotel staff at 6:30a.m to be loaded on the bus.

The next stop was Gallipoli where we visited the ANZAC cove, the memorial, Lone Pine and the monument of Kamal Ataturk the founder of modern Turkey and an astute military combat leader. It was sad to visit the

graves of Australian and New Zealander soldiers one as young as 17 years, many who fell to the bullets of the Turks who were waiting for these amateur soldiers landing at Gallipoli.

We then drove to Troy (Troas as mentioned in the New Testament and present day Hissarlik) a city visited during St. Paul's 2nd and 3rd journeys. (Acts 16:9-10 & Acts 20:5). This is the legendary city of the Trojan horse and a thriving Aegean Sea port of those days and hence an important Roman city. Was founded in 310B.C by Alexander the Great's army general Alexandria Troas.

This was the town where St. Paul had a vision of a man of Macedonia pleading him to visit his country and help them, (Acts16:8-10) and also where he performed the miracle of reviving Eutychus who dozed and fell down three floors while listening to St. Paul. (Acts20:7-12). It is here that he was joined by Timothy as they then set sail on his return after his 3rd missionary journey en route to Jerusalem and where he announced

to the people assembled there including the elders of Ephesus whom he had invited to come over to Troy that they would not see him again!(Acts20;25) and knelt down and prayed knowing the fate that waited him in Jerusalem.

Troy is a city that had been rebuilt eight times and as the archaeologist dug deeper they discovered this fact in the different layers they unearthed. The location of the city must have been so important that despite the earthquakes and destruction of the city that it was rebuilt repeatedly.

From Troy we visited Pergamon (Bergamon) a city which was the first Medical Centre (hospital) in the world dedicated to Askelpion the Greek God of Medicine. They had a a vast establishment of trained physicians and assistants, providing care which bordered on psycho/physiotherapy and music therapy. There is a broad street running to the the hospital wards, the patients after being triaged at the entrance would be driven over to the consulting rooms in a horse driven chariot. There is a constant flowing spring water in this place which was touted to have medicinal properties. We were told that patients who only had a chance of survival would only be admitted, oh yes the stay and therapy was only for the affordable!

The next day we visited the ruins of Ephesus then a thriving sea port, and certainly this was one of the highlights of the trip realising that we are in one of the chapters in the New Testament. This seaport was visited by St. Paul on his return from the journey and onward during his 3rd mission and is from where he had

written the first letter to the Corinthian and famously wrote " If I speak in human and angelic tongues but do not have love, I am a resounding gong or a clashing cymbal" (1Cor:13, 1). It is in the letter to the Ephesians he enumerates the fruits of the flesh and that of the Spirit. (Ephesians 5: 19-23). The letters to Phillipians, Galatians, and the Gospel and letters of St. John are also believed to have been drafted here. The third ecumenical Council in 431 A.D. was held in Ephesus. The first council was in Nicaea (modern-day city Iznik in Turkiy'a), in 325 A.D., and the second in Constantinople in 381 A.D. This highlights the importance of Turkey (Asia Minor) on the map of Christian History, not to mention that the seven churches mentioned in the Book of Revelations are all in the western part of Turkey. The first church was located at Ephesus, the first stop along the trade route, followed by Smyrna, now İzmir, then the great city of Pergamon, then Thyatira, wealthy Sardis, Philadelphia and finally Laodicea, near modern-day Denizli.

This also happens to be the place where St. John had spent a long time and a stone's throw from Ephesus in Selcuk is where he was buried. A huge Church (St. John's Basilica) was built over his tomb by Emperor Justinian in the sixth century.

Ephesus was a city seaport but since then has receded from the sea. The sea is 1.5 km from the ruins now. The city boasted one of the seven wonders of the Old World, the Temple of Artemis (Diana for the Romans). This temple was also made of marble, four times the dimensions of the Parthenon in Athens would have been so splendorous both during the day and night. During the day the white marble would be glinting in the sun and at night the candles and fires made it visible far into the sea, kind of a Light House. The city also boasts one of the largest open-air theatres with the best acoustics and a seating capacity of 25,000. This indicates the population(approx.250,000) and popularity of this city in the Hellenistic and Roman periods. The temple was alleged to have been destroyed for the last time by the Christians when Christianity became a dominant religion.

Demetrius initiated the crowds against St. Paul because they were losing their business of making silver idols of Artemis because of St. Paul's conversions. (Acts 19:23-27) It was here that St. Paul spoke fearlessly in the synagogue and the lecture hall of Tyrannus (Acts19:8,9) and where he was able to heal many and put the fear of Jesus in the seven sons of Sceva the Jewish high priest. (Acts19:15).

The city had the largest library (The Celsius Library) in the world even more collection than Alexandria which until then was the largest. The gates of Hercules, the sidewalks adorned by carvings of soldiers in battle, other depicting stories f the Roman gods, the shopping plaza etcshowed the opulence of the city and how thriving it would have been in the days of St. Paul when he walked through the streets to and from the port. The city was under the roman governor Lucinius when Mark Antony & Cleopatra paid a visit he was not sure of their intentions so to welcome and get into his good books he got the street to the harbour washed in red wine and that is how the term Red Carpet" welcome originated!

St. Paul used the commerce and trading activity of Ephesus to his advantage spreading the Word and this became the centre





of evangelization of "people from all over Asia" (Acts 19:10). It was here that he met Apollos of Alexandria who had a thorough knowledge of the scriptures (Acts18:14) and also rebaptized the followers of John the Baptist with the Holy Spirit (Acts19:6).

On the mountains in the city of Izmir was another marvelous and sacred place of Christianity. The Christians lived in fear of persecution and they sought refuge in the hills away from the city. Several Christian families and holy women had already settled there, some in caves in the earth or in the rocks and some in fragile huts. They lived a quarter of an hour from each other to avoid being detected and rounded up together. The house of St. Mary where she is believed to have spent her last days was the only house made of stone and the sea can be seen from its backyard. It was a house made by St. John for Mother Mary after they fled Jerusalem once the Jews set Lazarus and his sisters adrift into the sea. It is said that after our Lord's Ascension Mary lived for three years on Mount Zion, for three years in Bethany, and for nine years in Ephesus three and half hours of walking distance from Ephesus to be precise. St. John had built the house on the western slope of the hill not far from Selcuk before he brought Mother Mary here.

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
